





The Borough of East Berlin, Pennsylvania is located at a historic crossroads and is bordered by Conewago and Beaver Creeks. It is bisected by State Routes 234 (King Street) and 194 (Abbottstown and Harrisburg Streets). These main streets, and Locust Street, are lined with an impressive number of 18th and 19th century buildings.

The East Berlin Historic District was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1985. It included 117 contributing buildings. Examples shown today are among those in excellent to good condition, with minimal alterations, mainly along West and East King Street.



























"The National Register of Historic Places is the official list of our country's historic buildings, districts, sites, structures, and objects worthy of preservation.

Listing historic properties in the National Register encourages their preservation and marks them as important touchstones of our shared heritage.


However, simply listing important places on the federal register **isn't enough to prevent demolition.** Most legal power to protect historic places rests chiefly with **local government**."

When a municipality wants to **prevent unregulated and insensitive change** in its historic core, including demolition, they will often create a **local historic district** deemed significant to the municipality's cultural fabric, identity and economy.

The main tool is the **preservation ordinance**, a local statute that contains provisions for **designating historic resources**, a **design review board** (also called a preservation or historic district commission) and a **design review process and guidelines**."



The boroughs of **Gettysburg** and **Fairfield** are the only municipalities in Adams County that have a preservation ordinance. East Berlin is fortunate to have many property owners who sensitively maintain and modernize their historic buildings, but the borough does not have a preservation ordinance to ensure their longterm protection or prevent their demolition.

In **Fairfield**, alterations, renovations or remodeling of historic structures require **review and approval** by the **Fairfield Historical Architectural Review Board**. Upon approval, the HARB recommends that the Borough Council authorize a **Certificate of Appropriateness** (COA).
