



### Early Literacy Extras:

Parents and caregivers are a child's first and best teachers. Here are some ideas and activities to try this week with your child. These five practices are designed to help your child develop literacy skills, engage your child, and enhance the bonds between you. Storytimes at the Adams County Library support Pennsylvania Early Learning Standards.

This week's theme was: **Colors**

**Read:** Watch Miss Theresa read *Seven Blind Mice* by Edwin Young on our Youth Services Facebook page or YouTube Channel.

**Talk:** Talk about different colors and how they can make things look a certain way.

**Sing:** Rhymes to do at Home

**Play:** Play a sorting game. Take a pile of things and see who can sort them by color the fastest.

**Write:** Watch milk change color!

Supplies:

Milk (2% or whole works the best)

Plate (high enough ridges so milk won't spill out)

Q-Tip

Dawn Dish Soap

Food Dye

Fill plate up with milk. Add one drop of each food color dye (red, green, yellow, blue) in the center. Place a drop of dish soap on the end of the Q-tip and place it in center of the milk.

Watch as the colors expand in the milk!

The fourth one said, "I'm yellow as  
the sun"  
The fifth one said, "Being purple is  
fun!"  
Five little crayons, happy as can be  
(hold up 5 fingers)  
Coloring pictures with you and me  
(point to person and then self)
