Early Literacy Extras:

Parents and caregivers are a child's first and best teachers. Here are some ideas and activities to try this week with your child. These five practices are designed to help your child develop literacy skills, engage your child, and enhance the bonds between you. Storytimes at the Adams County Library support Pennsylvania Early Learning Standards.

This week's theme: Fourth of July

Read: Watch Miss Crystal read *Happy Fourth* of *July, Jenny Sweeney!* by Leslie Kimmelman on our Youth Services Facebook page or YouTube Channel.

Talk: Talk about how the 4th of July is our country's birthday. Tell your child how old the United States will be this July 4th.

Sing: Rhymes to do at Home

Play: Make an American flag snack. Cover a graham cracker with white frosting, or yogurt, and decorate with red and blue m&m's or strawberries and blueberries.

Write: Make some decorations for the holiday. Have your child draw triangles on red, white and blue paper and then have them cut them out. Punch holes in two corners of each triangle. Thread a ribbon or string through the holes of the triangles one at a time to make a patriotic bunting to hang in the house or window.
