### Early Literacy Extras:

Parents and caregivers are a child's first and best teachers. Here are some ideas and activities to try this week with your child. These five practices are designed to help your child develop literacy skills, engage your child, and enhance the bonds between you. Storytimes at the Adams County Library support Pennsylvania Early Learning Standards.

## This week's theme: Music

**Read:** Watch Miss Cindie read *Pokko and the Drum by Matthew Forsythe* on our Youth Services Facebook page or YouTube Channel.

**Talk:** Talk with your child about all the different instruments you saw in the book. Have fun trying to make the sounds they each make. Ask what instrument they might like to learn how to play.

Sing: Rhymes to do at Home

**Play:** Find some empty cans, containers, cartons or boxes and invite your child to try drumming on them with their hands or with spoons or sticks. (Coffee cans and tall oatmeal containers make great drums!) Gather other instruments you might have, kazoos, bells, whatever, and make a band or a parade.

**Write:** With your child draw and color a pattern – like the one on Pokko's drum – on a piece of white paper. Then attach it to one of your homemade drums.
