Early Literacy Extras:

Parents and caregivers are a child's first and best teachers. Here are some ideas and activities to try this week with your child.

These five practices are designed to help your child develop literacy skills, engage your child, and enhance the bonds between you.

Storytimes at the Adams County Library support Pennsylvania Early Learning Standards.

This week's theme was: **Farm Animals**

Read: Watch Miss Emily read *Duck On A Bike,* by *David Shannon* on our Youth Services Facebook page or YouTube Channel.

Talk: Talk about all the animals who live on a farm. Practice making their sounds. Babies love to make sounds and listen to you make lots of different sounds. This is great for early language development

Sing: Rhymes to do at Home

Play: Use blocks to build a barnyard for any farm animal toys or stuffed animals to live in. Make-believe your child is the farmer taking care of all the animals.

Write: Draw a simple outline of a cow, pig or duck and let your child use crayons or finger paint to add color to the animals.
