



Early Literacy Extras:

Parents and caregivers are a child's first and best teachers. Here are some ideas and activities to try this week with your child. These five practices are designed to help your child develop literacy skills, engage your child, and enhance the bonds between you. This week's theme was: **Fall**

Sing: Rhymes to do at Home

Play: Go on an outdoor scavenger hunt. Can you find any leaves with different colors or shapes?

Write: Go outside and gather some leaves! Have each child place a leaf under a piece of paper and color on top of the paper with crayons. The leaf shape will appear! This works best with green leaves (dried leaves will just crunch and fall apart), but use brown, yellow, red, and orange crayons for a fall-themed craft.
